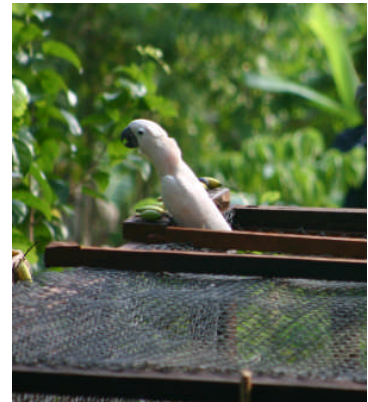


Help Us Give Them a Second Chance!

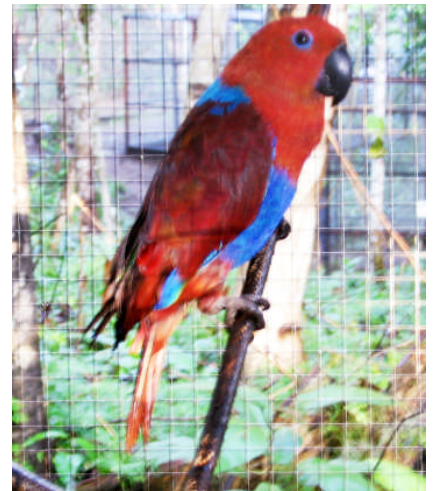
The Rehabilitation Center **KEMBALI BEBAS** on Seram Island, Indonesia currently is the home to over 100 cockatoos, parrots and lorries. Most are wild psittacines confiscated by the Indonesian authorities from smugglers and trappers and turned over to us for care. Each bird is carefully assessed, given medical care and rehabilitated if possible. Some birds can be released back into the wild; some will be given Sanctuary for life in our Center, especially those who have sustained major injuries.

These Moluccan cockatoos *photos right* are some of the lucky ones. Trapped on Seram and confiscated before they were smuggled off the island, they still retained their wildness and fear of humans. Following testing for disease and rehabilitation, they were released back into their forest home in March, 2006.



The *first photo* shows a female Eclectus starving to death after confiscation from smugglers; the *second photo* shows marked improvement in feathering after her first eleven months at Kembali Bebas.



Lories are care-free, comical bundles of feathers. However, they are commonly trapped for the pet trade and fed an improper diet. (*Photo left Black-capped lory*). The Purple-naped lory (*Photo right*) is in Kembali Bebas and hopefully on his way back to freedom.



However, the cost of running this Center in the middle of a tropical rainforest is substantial. Our program to “Rescue a Wild Parrot” is an informative and enjoyable way to not only contribute to this process, but actually be PART of it. There are multiple levels at which you can participate.

The first is to donate care for one month, three months, six months or a full year for a Cockatoo (Moluccan, Umbrella, Citron-crested, Lesser Sulfur-crested, Eleonora, Triton or Palm); Eclectus Parrot; Lory (Violet-naped, Moluccan Red, Blue-streaked, Black-capped, Chattering) or Lorikeet (Green-naped or “Rainbow”).

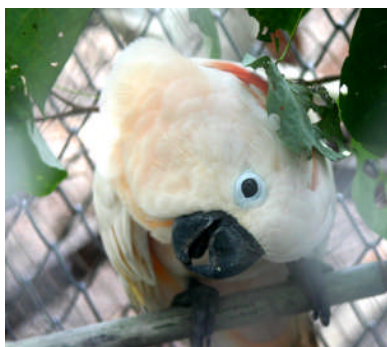

Socialization/Sanctuary Cage for Cockatoos (25’x9’x9’)	\$ 1750
Socialization/Sanctuary Cage of Parrots (18’x9’x9’)	\$ 1250
Socialization/Sanctuary Cage for Lories (15’x9’x9’)	\$ 750
Quarantine Cages for new birds (4.5’x4.5’x4.5’)	\$ 100

All contributors will receive a quarterly e-newsletter describing recent activities (including new bird acquisitions) at Kembali Bebas Rehabilitation Center. This newsletter will be sent only to the members of our “Rescue a Wild Parrot” Program. Each will feature information about a different Indonesian specie residing at the Center. For those groups or individuals who donate a permanent structure, (cages or flights), we will place a thank-you plaque on your cage and send you a photo of it.

Please note: Because these are wild animals, none of the birds is given a name. For the same reason, no single, specific bird can be “adopted” or assigned to a particular donor. We do not identify or provide photographs of a specific bird for donors to “adopt” because our census of birds is always changing. Instead, photographs of a number of our ‘rescue’ birds and their stories will be posted on a dedicated page on our website.
